Ebox1—Precipitating and other preceding circumstances of suicide — National Violent Death Reporting System

## **Suicide Decedent Precipitating Circumstances**

- <u>Intimate partner problems</u>- problems with a current or former intimate partner that appear to have contributed to the suicide.
- <u>Civil legal problems</u>- civil legal (non-criminal) problems appear to have contributed to the death.
- <u>Financial problems</u>- problems such as bankruptcy, overwhelming debt, or foreclosure of a home or business.
- <u>Job problems</u>- Job problem(s) appear to have contributed to the death. Problems could be related to work performance or joblessness (e.g., having difficulty finding a job).
- Other relationship problems- decedent had relationship problems with a family member (other than an intimate partner), a friend, or an associate that appear to have contributed to the death.
- <u>Physical health problems</u> physical health problem(s) appear to have contributed to the death (e.g., despondent over recent diagnosis of cancer or complain that he could not live with the pain associated with a condition).

## Other Preceding Circumstances Relevant to the Suicide Decedent

- <u>Current depressed mood</u> perceived by self or others to be depressed at the time of the injury.
- Mental health condition identified as having a mental health condition or syndrome listed in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual, Version IV (DSM-IV).
- <u>Alcohol dependence</u> identified as having an alcohol dependence problem.
- Other substance abuse problems identified as having a non-alcohol related substance abuse problem.
- Positive toxicology results for alcohol tested positive for alcohol on a toxicology exam.
- <u>Current mental health/substance abuse treatment</u> currently in treatment for a mental health condition or a substance abuse problem.
- <u>History of mental health/substance abuse treatment</u> had a history of ever being treated for a mental health condition or substance abuse problem.
- <u>History of suicide attempts</u> had a history of attempting suicide before the fatal incident.
- <u>Disclosed intent to die by suicide</u> disclosed to another person his/her thoughts and/or plans to commit suicide within the last month. Disclosure of suicidal thoughts or plan can be verbal, written or electronic.
- <u>Person left a suicide note</u> decedent left a note, e-mail message, video, or other communication indicating an intent to die by suicide.

## Circumstances for Potential Prevention Opportunities among Intimate Partner Homicide-Suicides

- <u>History of physical domestic violence by perpetrator</u> history of physical violence within the household perpetrated by the perpetrator.
- <u>Current restraining order against perpetrator by victim</u> victim had a current restraining/protective order in place against the perpetrator.
- <u>History of law enforcement being called to residence</u> intimate partners' household had a history of contact with law enforcement for domestic issues.
- <u>History of court interaction with perpetrator</u> perpetrator had court/legal intervention for domestic violence issues
- <u>Perpetrator jealousy of current/former intimate partner's new relationship or perceived new relationship</u> perpetrator's jealousy or distress over a current or former intimate partner's relationship or suspected relationship with another person led to the incident.
- Recent breakup there was a recent discussion of break up, or the couple was in the process of a break up (e.g. moving out, serving divorce papers).
- Perpetrator made threats to kill victim perpetrator made threats to kill the victim either directly to the victim or

- to another bystander (e.g., an acquaintance of the victim or perpetrator).
- <u>Mental or physical burden of caring for victim</u> perpetrator mental or physical burden of caring for the victim was mentioned as a contributing factor.
- <u>Perpetrator's physical health issues played a role in the incident perpetrator's health issues contributed to the incident (e.g., the perpetrator claimed he physically could no longer care for his spouse because of health issues.)</u>
- <u>Victim's physical health issues played a role in the incident</u> victim's health issues contributed to the incident (e.g., the perpetrator claimed he did not want to see his spouse suffer any more).
- <u>Nursing homes/assisted living played a role in the incident</u> mention of nursing homes/assisted living playing a role in the incident.
